Information regarding the Fukushima Prefecture press tour for foreign press

### Date: August 2nd (Thu) Location: Fukushima Prefecture (Fukushima City – Naraha City)

The PR office for the 2018 1000km long-distance relay "Ashita Eno Michi (Road to Tomorrow)," which is scheduled for July 24th (Tue), 2018 to August 7th (Tue), 2018, will be holding an international press tour for this relay.

The "2018 1000km long-distance relay Ashita Eno Michi (Road to Tomorrow)" will run from Aomori to Tokyo, connecting areas impacted by the 2011 East Japan major earthquake disaster (total length approximately 1300km, approximately 150 areas) via running and bicycling; by spreading the word about recovery efforts it endeavors to ensure that the memories of the disaster are not forgotten, and it intends to deepen the bond between participants from all over the country and those impacted by the disaster. With the start of this relay, we will be holding a press tour for international press that will visit the relay route and areas targeted for recovery in Fukushima (Fukushima City, Naraha City) and will include exchanges between relay participants and disaster area residents.

# <Sales figures that fell significantly after the earthquake disaster have recovered to levels higher than they were before the disaster!>\_\_\_\_\_\_

After the East Japan Major Earthquake Disaster and Tokyo Electric Dai-ichi Fukushima Nuclear Plant incident, Marusei Fruit Farm took steps to becoming GAP (Good Agricultural Practice) certified in order to eliminate reputational damage.They were JGAP certified (the Japanese version of GAP) in June of 2013, and global GAP certified in December of 2016; despite sales having fallen after the disaster, through these GAP measures they were able to restore sales to pre-disaster levels by 2016, and in 2017 surpassed those sales.Because of their GAP measures and efforts to spread the word about the benefits and safety of Fukushima's produce via their café businesses, Marusei Fruit Farm won the gold medal at the 3rd Fukushima Economics/Agriculture/Artisan awards.



## Coverage 3 – Fukushima City – Fukushima's prefectural Azuma Stadium

### <Thoughts from the baseball stadium selected for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and the notion of "recovery Olympics">

With a capacity of 30,000 (including infield and outfield), this stadium is capable of accommodating a variety of games ranging from high school to professional baseball.

The "2018 Japan vs. USA Softball Match," in which the U.S. women's softball team faced Japan's national team "TOP," was held on June 23rd, 2018 and drew 7000 enthusiastic spectators. A portion of the baseball/softball matches in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics will be held here.



# Coverage 4 – Naraha City – J Village National Training Center

### < Reopening on July 28th after serving as an operating base during the Dai-ichi Nuclear Reactor accident after the earthquake disaster>

J Village was established in 1997 as Japan's first national soccer training center; since its inception it has hosted Japan's world cup national team's training camp and has hosted events and training camps for numerous teams in a variety of categories.

The facility was out of operation due to the East Japan Major Earthquake Disaster of March 2011, and having completed its role as an operating base during the Tokyo Electric Fukushima Dai-ichi Nuclear Reactor incident, it is finally reopening on July 28th (Sat) after 7 years and 4 months.

The facilities that will reopen include 5 natural grass fields, 1 artificial turf field, the stadium, hotel, and restaurant.
