The event is set to return once again in 2023 on the July 7-9 weekend.

6. National Fireworks Festival Dedicated to Ise-Jingu

The 71st National Fireworks Festival celebrating the Ise-Jingu returns for the first time in four years on July 15th. The Ise-Jingu, located in Ise City, Mie Prefecture, is dedicated to the sun deity Amaterasu Omikami, considered the ancestral deity of the Japanese imperial family.

The shinto shrine complex also includes other auxiliary buildings, gardens, and sacred bridges. It offers a serene and tranquil atmosphere, inviting visitors to experience the spiritual essence of Shinto.
