

## The Hiroshima Peace Memorial City Construction Law (Enacted on August 6, 1949)

- Article 1 It shall be the object of the present law to provide for the construction of the city of Hiroshima as a peace memorial city to symbolize the human ideal of sincere pursuit of genuine and lasting peace.
- Article 6 The mayor of Hiroshima shall, with the cooperation of residents and support from relevant organizations, establish a program of continuous activity toward completion of the Hiroshima Peace Memorial City.

#### It is important to have many policymakers come to Hiroshima to:


- Understand the reality of the atomic bombing,

- ☐ Established in 1982 (registered as an NGO in the UN Economic and Social Council in 1991)
- ☐ Members: 8,265 from 166 countries and regions (as of July 1, 2023)
- ☐ President: Mayor of Hiroshima, Vice-President: 11 mayors

#### **The Culture of Peace**

#### **Current Reality**

- There are countries causing war
- There are countries with nuclear weapons

#### <Response>

- 1) Take away the motivation for starting wars
- Do not allow the number of nuclear weapons to further increase beyond current

#### **Our Ideal**

- · Wars should not be fought
- Nuclear weapons should be abolished

#### <Response>

- 1) Declare an end to wars
- 2) Aim for the abolition of the absolute evil that is nuclear weapons

Have policymakers pursue our ideal with the support of civil society

## A-bombed buildings and trees are valuable witnesses to history that convey the realities of the bombing

#### **A-bombed Buildings**

**Criteria:** Must be an existing A-bombed building within 5 km from the hypocenter

Registered buildings: 86 (22 owned publicly, 64 owned privately)

#### A-bombed Trees

**Criteria:** Must be existing an A-bombed tree within 2 km from the hypocenter


Registered trees: Approximately 160

### **Training official A-bomb Legacy Successors**

#### **Number of A-bomb Legacy Successors: 195**

□ After a 2-year training program, legacy successors give presentations to students on field trips and others at the Peace Memorial Museum or are dispatched to venues upon request from schools or other entities.



#### Hibakusha Family Member Legacy Successor: 7

☐ Program began in FY 2022 to inherit and convey wider variety of *hibakusha* experiences by members of their families.
