- **Summit-level international conference on African development** launched by Japan in 1993.
- In addition to the TICAD co-organizers (UN, UNDP, World Bank and AUC), **a variety of stakeholders** involved in African development including international organizations, private sector, civil society, and local governments will participate.



Overview

- Dates and Location : 20th to 22nd August 2025, in Yokohama
- **Co-creating innovative solutions** to the challenges facing Africa **by leveraging Japan's technology and expertise.**
- Discussing in three areas; *Economy, Peace and stability* and *Society*, focusing on cross-cutting themes such as **‘sustainable development led by private sector’**, **‘youth and women’**, and **‘regional integration and strengthening connectivity within and outside Africa’**.
- **A number of thematic events** (seminars, booths and exhibits) will be organized by international organizations, private companies, civil society organizations.

Economy

- Infrastructure development for sustainable development led by private sector
- Regional integration, connectivity within and outside Africa
- Economic diversification by strengthening industrial ecosystem

Peace and Stability

- Promoting democracy, good governance, and the rule of law
- Prevention of conflict and consolidation of peace by African initiatives
- Strengthening community infrastructure and Promoting Women, Peace, and Security (WPS)

Society

- Health initiatives such as infectious disease control, better health security, and universal health coverage (UHC)
- Education, capacity building and human resource development with a focus on youth and women
- Strengthening environmental and disaster resilience

- 1 Africa as **a continent with dynamic growth potential**, with a projected population of about 2.5 billion in 2050, about a quarter of the world's population (and about a third of the youth population)

In Africa, **economic growth is often boosted** by leapfrogging **which involves adopting innovation to introduce new services.**

It is important to **incorporate the vitality of young growing Africa through fostering development and strengthening public-private partnerships, while leveraging problem-solving expertise of Japanese companies.**

- 2 **Growing presence of African countries** in the international community, with African countries accounting for roughly a **quarter of the total number of UN member states** and the African Union (AU) **joining the G20 in 2023**

It is important to strengthen cooperation with African countries through the TICAD process to enhance inclusive and responsible global governance including promoting the rule of law.

T I C A D I (1993) Tokyo

Provided an opportunity to bring back global attention to Africa in Post-Cold War era.

T I C A D II (1998) Tokyo

Clearly articulated priority policies and actions.

Highlighted the importance of ownership and partnership.

T I C A D III (2003) Tokyo

Agreed on expanding partnership to include Asian countries.

Focused on the concept of human security.

T I C A D IV (2008) Yokohama

Established the follow-up mechanism.

T I C A D V (2013) Yokohama

Advocated for the *Quality Growth* and promotion of trade and investment through public-private partnerships.

T I C A D VI (2016) Nairobi (Kenya)

First TICAD held in Africa.

Announced investment for Africa's future through quality infrastructure investment, human resource development, etc.

T I C A D 7 (2019) Yokohama

Mainly focused on African business.

Discussions based on three Pillars:

Economy, Society and Peace and Stability.

T I C A D 8 (2022) Tunis (Tunisia)

As partner growing together with Africa, aiming for a resilient Africa.
