# Japan-China Relations -Measures by Japan to Lessen Tensions

- There is active debate within Japan regarding the circumstances under which Prime Minister Takaichi made her statement, whether its content was appropriate, and what conditions would even constitute an "existential crisis."
- → The polarization of Japan's discourse space continues to intensify.
- → Both those leaning left and right tend to pigeonhole themselves into simplistic frameworks like "anti-China" or "pro-China." They end up solely asserting their own legitimacy and attacking each other, perpetually unable to engage in constructive debate.
- The current Chinese government cannot possibly understand the significance of the debate in Japan, and under strict censorship, it is blocking diverse discussions within China.
- To comprehend China's actions, it is essential to understand key information, the nature of restriction of speech by the Chinese government and its affiliated agencies, and the narratives they construct.

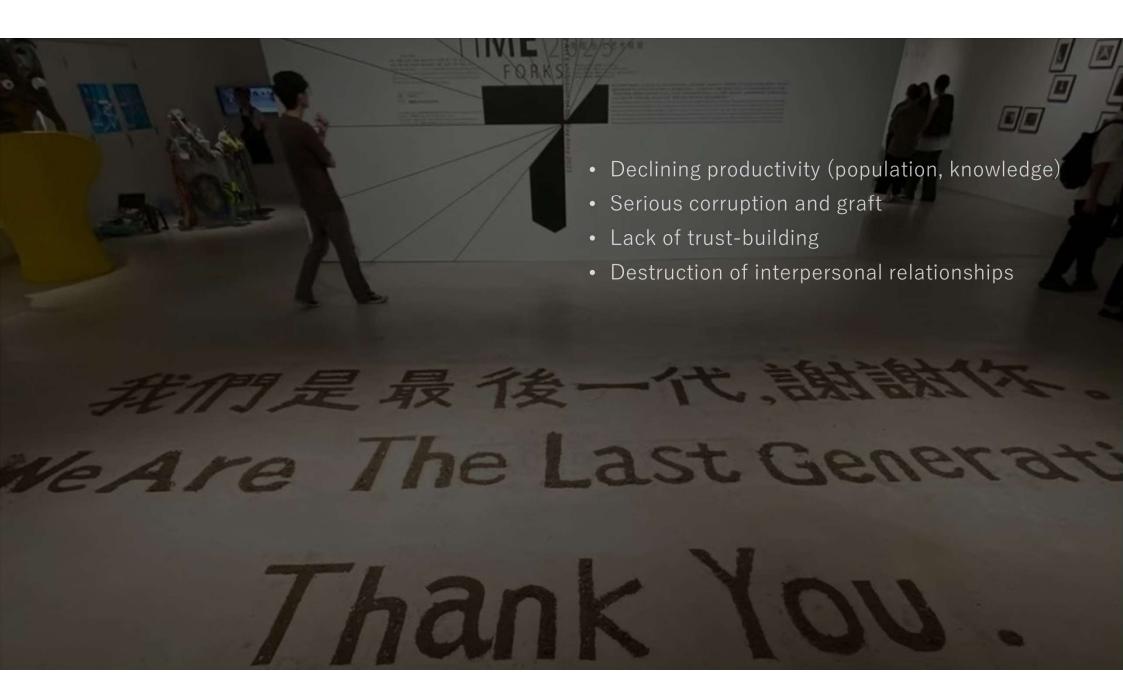
What Is Needed to Lessen Tensions in Japan-China Relations?

- The Chinese government's narrative is deliberate. If Japan is swayed by it, it will harm its national interests.
- Arguments Japan considers legitimate fall on deaf ears with the current Chinese government, and Japan must create narratives that counter China's narrative.
- (1) Narrative to Counter the Resurgence of Militarism
  - (2) Narrative of Democracy
- (3) Narrative of Autonomy and Independence

#### China's Society Rapidly Becoming Unstable Amid Economic Downturn

The Destruction of Humanity Has Also Reached Serious Levels

- China's restriction of speech and ideas, coupled with its deteriorating economic situation, has reached severe levels.
- Surveillance and censorship permeate every corner of society. Even organizing a book club of five or six people to discuss social issues can lead to police interrogation. Police keep a close watch on activities addressing poverty, environmental protection, labor issues, feminism, homosexuality, and other topics held in bars, cafes, and other small activity hubs. Individuals with organizational skills are marked.
- Young people who resisted China's strict zero-COVID policy and speech restrictions were arrested in China, and fled overseas after their release
- Some struggle to adapt to life in a foreign land and suffer from depression, yet they support each other through daily life. Unable to return home, some live in precarious circumstances and have taken their own lives.
- Currently in Japan, there are Chinese individuals who cannot return to their homeland, including church officials, human rights lawyers, investigative journalists, liberal intellectuals, and socially conscious artists.



The Background of the Recent Increase in Immigrants from Chinese-Speaking Regions to Japan

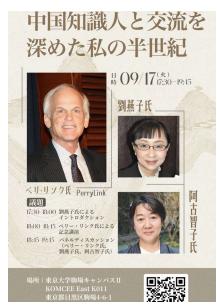
- China: Crackdowns on ethnic minorities, sexual minorities, intellectuals, and activists; further strengthening of restrictions on speech and surveillance systems through the zero-COVID policy
- Hong Kong: The enactment of the National Security Law led to the arrest of politicians, intellectuals, activists, and journalists; the closure of human rights and civic groups; and the introduction of a whistleblower system.
- Taiwan: As relations with China grow tense, there is a growing tendency to refrain from supporting human rights activists and others to avoid provoking China.
- Both China and Hong Kong are experiencing a significant deterioration in their economies, marked by rising corporate bankruptcies, increasing unemployment rates, falling real estate prices, and worsening fiscal conditions. Moving to Western countries is costly. Japan, with its weakening yen, offers cheaper real estate, lower prices, and more affordable tuition fees.
- There are also people seeking new business opportunities or jobs; those enrolling in language schools, universities, or graduate schools to change their life course; those leaving their home country temporarily or long-term to escape persecution; and those relocating for their children's education, among others.

# Communication with People of Differing Perspectives

- China: Great Leap Forward and Anti-Rightist Campaign Generation / Cultural Revolution Generation / Tiananmen Incident Generation / COVID-19 and White Paper Movement Generation / Feminism, LGBTQ+, sexual minorities
- Hong Kong: Umbrella Movement to Anti-Fugitive Offenders Bill Movement Generation / Postmovement political depression
- Taiwan: Young generation pursuing diversity and autonomy, not "surrender or resistance"
- Japan: Neutrality → Political taboos, lack of critical thinking, self-censoring democracy
- \*Interaction/Solidarity/Disconnection between social classes and generations
- \*As the participants pass away → Second generation, third generation. Newly created words, memories, post-memory
- \*All modern states have sought to support the legitimacy of their political systems and strengthen social cohesion and a sense of belonging by inventing, shaping, and stabilizing collective memory in some way (Hobsbawm and Ranger, 2012).
- →Memories are selectively enhanced and forgotten.
